Success in the RSC Chemistry Olympiad

The RSC Chemistry Olympiad is an annual competition organised by the *Royal Society of Chemistry*. It is targeted at the most able chemistry students in Year 13, nationally, and comprises two rounds.

The first round was a lengthy and challenging written chemistry examination. Students completed the written exam at home, scrutinised over Google Classroom. King Edward's had six students who volunteered for the Olympiad. These students were, Anna Dickson, Jacob Clutterbuck, Kian Moshiri, Matthew Sherwood, David Craven and James May. Pleasingly, all entrants achieved a certificated award for their performance which was either Bronze, Silver or Gold. Matthew and Kian achieved Gold. This represents an astounding achievement and placed these two students very highly, in the UK. Kian Moshiri's score was so high that it led to him being invited to the second round. Only around thirty students nationally get the invite. Looking at the scores of the other students that made the second round, Kian was placed very highly, even within this elite group.

The second round was used to decide which students would go on to represent the UK in Japan, later this year. The second round took place over a weekend. It included two bespoke lectures on very high-level chemistry and a four-hour exam. Students were also expected to read and understand two chapters from an undergraduate chemistry textbook. One of the chapters involved some difficult quantum mechanics! The level of the chemistry would genuinely challenge many undergraduates.

Having spent quite a lot of time with Kian, helping him to prepare, I can say that his ability in chemistry is exceptional. In twenty-five years of teaching chemistry at the School, I dare say that Kian is the most talented chemist that I have had the pleasure of working with. Sadly, he didn't make the national team of four students. Participants did not find out their score; only whether they were selected, or not. It is worth mentioning that Kian was also preparing for Grade 8 Piano and Flute, as well as his other A-Levels.

Kian has been offered a place at Trinity College, Cambridge to study Mathematics. He has told me that he may select some chemistry options at Cambridge, so that he can 'keep his hand in'.


INTERCAMBIO POR CARTAS 2021 YEAR 10 PEN-PAL PROJECT 2021

The Pen-Pal Project exchange took place between Year 10 students at King Edward VII School in Sheffield and 3ESO (Year 10) and 4ESO (Year 11) students at Sagrada Familia School in Molina de Segura, Murcia, Spain.

All our students and the Spanish students have been highly involved and thrilled with this project. Our main aims have been to:

- Provide students with the opportunity to put into practise all the theory, grammar rules and vocabulary into a real context.
- Communicate with international students via written letters.
- Promote the culture of the language they learn.
- Make new friends by getting to know new people of the same age.
- Completed a self-assessment students will provide and receive feedback on the mistakes in their letters.

The project has gone far beyond the academic goals we had set: all our students have made new friends to practise the language with and they will continue to develop their new friendships going forward.



Tamasha Theatre Playwriting Project



Merila Gramy and Florence Marston-Bolton in Year 10 have been part of this project since last summer. They were still students in Year 9, who had opted for GCSE Drama, when they got involved in writing, or as Fin Kennedy, the Artistic Director of Tamasha Theatre calls it 'playwrighting' - as in crafting – their own plays. The culmination of the project was for the students to submit their scripts to Fin Kennedy

and the team of playwrights at Tamasha Theatre. The company then selected their favorite scripts from across all the schools who entered with a view to those writers being offered some one-to-one mentoring and an invitation to complete a final draft for publication. Merilla and Flo's play, 'A Blank Page', was chosen and this term they have been working with Safaa Benson-Effiom to develop their script with a view to it being published alongside the other winning plays, as a celebration of young people's writing. The girls have loved working with Safaa over zoom – of course – and it has been lovely to welcome her (virtually) to our drama studio at upper school.



Safaa is a playwright and screenwriter. Her first full-length play, EVEN TO LIVE, was part of Talawa Firsts 2015. She gained her MA in Text and Performance from RADA and has had work staged at part of the RADA Festival. An alumni of the Soho Theatre Writers' Lab, Safaa's aim with her writing is to gain an understanding of the varied complexities of life from all perspectives, no matter how unpopular or unconventional.

Florence and Merila had this to say about the experience of working on this project and their play:

"From the first lockdown to now, from online Drama class all the way in June 2020 to mentoring (from Tamasha Theatre Company), a written play came to life. What started off as a simple six-word play, developed, underwent growth, and eventually got typed up, ended up as 'A Blank Page'. Our play is a creative testament to Covid as it spanned all three lockdowns and is representative of our ongoing persistence to write through and through (and our final piece). The Bitesize Playwrighting competition started it all and we were even chosen for two very amazing mentoring sessions - to write drafts, develop them and explore. Safaa (a member of the Tamasha Playwrights group) helped us write our drafts. From various suggestions, positive feedback, ideas that became more than words on paper, we were able to communicate with Safaa and produce our own ideas. The whole process was unforgettable, and we thoroughly enjoyed our time spent on 'A Blank Page'. We were honored to have been given such an incredible opportunity and are extremely proud of our piece. Anybody and everybody can give this experience a go!"

We have plans to do a performance of Merila and Flo's play next year as all it needs now is an audience!"

The students have been working with Mrs Evans on performing as an ensemble to bring characters and scenes to life from plays such as 'Ernie's Incredible 'Illucinations.' Year 8 students have also been honing their physical theatre skills using a diverse range of plays such as 'Daisy Pulls It Off', Blue Remembered Hills and 'The Insect Play'. Museums Sheffield Curatorial Project

A Level Fine Art and Photography students from King Edward VII will be curating an exhibition in School showcasing carefully selected works from Sheffield's extensive visual art collection; inspiring young people to understand and value art.

A small group of students will spend an afternoon with acclaimed artist Keith Piper as he curates his upcoming exhibition at The Graves Art Gallery in Sheffield. A unique opportunity to asks questions about curation, context and visual narrative.

Artist / Teacher Stephen Carley and Sheffield Museums curator Kirstie Hamilton will coordinate this exciting pilot project using the unique space of King Edward VII Upper

School on Glossop Road as an alternative exhibition venue bringing original works of art into the heart of an education establishment.

To quote from a recent letter from Museums Sheffield:

"The project will allocate funding to support a project that will

create tangible ways for people to engage with the Museums and Galleries collection in their formative years and explore how we can help young people to become more familiar with their collection and harness its potential as a resource for learning, inspiration and creativity.

We would like to work with you, your colleagues and a group of students from King Edward VII School to create a series of exhibitions curated with, by and for young people that will be displayed off site. The project will work towards the outcome of deepening young people's learning experiences and developing their understanding of, and relationship with, the collection they own. Central to this work will be the display of works from the collection in School in 2022 and then beyond this, potentially there will be a further three years of activity. The project will be approached and realised with the utmost professionalism broadening the knowledge and understanding of the participants as well as giving them insight into working in a cultural organisation. Beyond those immediately involved, the exhibitions will also engage with the wider cohort of young people studying at the School and there is the potential for other subject areas to become involved".





Healthy Hampers in Support of Survivors of Human Trafficking in Sheffield

This year a group of Sixth Form students have worked with the Sheffield Soroptimists on a project in support of Snowdrop, a charity which works with survivors of Human Trafficking and Modern Day Slavery. The idea for the Healthy Hampers project came from the workers at Snowdrop itself, as they had identified healthy food as a basic need for their clients as well as as a way of welcoming the women (and often their children) to the city and helping them integrate by sharing cooking recipes from each others' cultures.

Moving the project forward has been a challenge this year, as we were not able to meet in person and had to conduct all our work and communications online. However, we are delighted to tell you that on Wednesday 30th June the first four Healthy Hampers have been delivered to the Snowdrop Project and distributed by the case workers to the women and families most in need.

The deliveries consisted of a box of ingredients with the recipe cards, designed and written by the King Edward VII students in simple English, a bag of utensils (saucepans, casserole dishes, chopping board etc) as well as the ingredients to cook the dish.

Over the next few weeks we hope to put together more boxes and get them delivered.

Extended Project Qualification



This year sixteen Year 13 students completed their Extended Project Qualification, a self directed project that requires 120 hours of independent work and is worth half an A Level. It is always impressive that students are able to balance this extra curricular project alongside their A Levels, however this year it is more impressive than ever given the significant disruption these students have had with school closures. Mrs Brown (EPQ co-ordinator) and the team of EPQ supervisors are very proud of the students for the dedication and organisation they have shown and for the quality of their work.

Students choose their own topic, carry out in depth research into it and complete either a 5000 word report or produce an artefact with a shorter report. Many of this year's students have completed projects that are closely linked to the courses they have applied for at university, including three students who have offers at Oxbridge universities.

At the end of the project students are required to deliver a presentation to their supervisor and a small audience. It was fantastic to watch these presentations - the students spoke confidently and passionately about their chosen topics and reflected insightfully on the experience of completing the project. One student said, "The skills I have learnt will help me at university, but most importantly I have really enjoyed it!". Several students commented on how it had helped them with their A Level studies and they all could see how the skills they have developed through the EPQ will help them in the future at university. A couple of students even reflected on how the experience had been a welcome distraction during lockdown, giving them something positive to focus on.

We are now focusing on supporting the Year 12 cohort as they continue the projects they began in January into Year 13, and we are looking forward to welcoming a number the new Year 12s onto the EPQ when we start again in January 2022.

Post 18 Transition for Year 12 students

Summer term means that our Year 12 students are starting to consider their plans for life after King Edward VII and participating in our Post 18 Transition programme. The programme has been adapted this year and all our Year 12 students have spent a whole day with their new tutors so they can benefit from the guidance of their tutors and the Post 16 Team.

Students have been working on activities based around the Unifrog platform which will help with writing strong personal statements and references. Much of the focus this half term will be based on how to apply on UCAS and be successful in gaining offers for university places. We are also providing information to students about the virtual open days now being offered by many universities. In addition, staff have also supported students who have applied for various summer schools.

We held meetings for Year 12 students considering applying for medicine, dentistry, veterinary science at Oxford or Cambridge. These students will also be receiving additional support as their completed UCAS applications are expected to be with us by 14th September so that they meet the deadline for early applicants set by UCAS in October. We are confident that even in these unusual circumstances all our students will be able to access the support they need.

We also recognise that not all our students will be wanting to go to university and information about apprenticeships and other routes are also being made available. There has also been tailored advice for students who are considering foundation art routes.





South Yorkshire

Awareness of the climate change, its impacts and the need for change are issues that many young people are aware of and some quite informed. King Edward VII School has an active Eco-School Committee, made up of young people across all three key stages, from both Lower and Upper School sites.

Schools' Climate Education South Yorkshire (SCESY) is a small organisation of educationalists across a number of primary and secondary schools, primarily in Sheffield. Mark Lallemand, one of the Teachers in the English Department at King Edward VII School is a member of the organizing committee. SCESY's aim is to support schools, teachers and students on their climate education journey. This ranges from the specifics of reducing carbon emissions as a school to promoting active citizenship in relation to the climate and ecological emergency, encouraging respect and understanding for the environment from school, to home, nationally and internationally. This is now a significant part of the agenda of King Edward VII School, which has explicit objectives written into the School Improvement Plan, referring directly to aspects such as carbon footprint auditing and assessing the carbon footprint of goods and services bought in by the School.

From 5th to 7th July SCESY put on its first virtual online conference for schools in South Yorkshire. Forty primary and secondary schools signed up and King Edward VII was one of the first schools to sign up, through Eco-School staff leads, Mr Johnston, from the Geography Department, and Mrs Bishop, from the non-teaching staff.

The conference was due to be held last year and hosted by Sheffield Hallam University but because of the pandemic had be postponed. It has not been possible to host a face to face conference this year, so everything has moved online. Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 engaged in assemblies about the conference, took part in a competition to invent a new climate related word for a future dictionary, and took part in online workshops from the comfort of their Science, Maths, Geography, PSHE and Food Technology lessons.

The conference was opened by Dame Sarah Storey, winner of 14 Paralympian Gold Medals, and Active Travel Commissioner for Sheffield City Region.

Some of the stand-out workshops that were planned:





Students created their own wind turbines and discussed ways to supply power to our cities of the future in a more sustainable way.

Yorkshire Students explored practical ways in which our own School grounds can be Wildlife Trust made more environmentally and nature friendly.



BOSH! are two chefs from Sheffield who met at school and have teamed up to create fun, tasty and awesome plant-based food that even the most committed carnivore will love! They held a live cooking workshop which will got those tastebuds going!



Hope for the Future worked with students on how they can effectively engage their MPs in coming up with policies that will have an impact on the way the UK moves towards a zero carbon future. They finished with a live workshop with Sheffield Hallam MP Olivia Blake, and students were able to

ask her questions about her life in politics and how we can tackle climate change issues as a School and as a country.



This workshop, run by the Centre for Alternative Technology in Wales, gave students the chance to examine the data in relation to carbon emissions, explored how the UK can move towards a zero carbon future, encouraged students to envisage a positive sustainable and just future world, where no-one is left behind in the move towards a low carbon economy.

So, what were some of the outcomes from this conference for King Edward VII School? Maybe students will lead the School in looking at some of the following:

- How the food we offer can be even more local, sustainably sourced and packaged.
- How the energy we use as a School can be reduced even further.
- How the School can explore more sustainable and renewable energy supplies, such as ground source heating and solar panels.
- How the School can promote even more sustainable ways of getting to and from School for staff and students.
- How our School grounds can be increasingly transformed into a nature friendly, litter free environment.



King Edward VII School Census

The census is a survey that happens every ten years and gives a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. The answers households give to the census questions help organisations make decisions on planning and funding public services in your area, including transport, education and healthcare.

The latest census took place on Sunday 21st March 2021. To help celebrate this event, students took part in activities in Geography lessons about the census and students were also invited to take part in a "just for fun" King Edward VII school census. 249 students took part and there were responses from every year group in school.



Here are the results of the King Edward VII census:

Music Department



We've been extremely grateful to be able to continue teaching in our specialist music rooms this academic year. Although we've been restricted in terms of teaching in bubbles, unable to fully utilise our practice rooms or group work, the students have shown great resilience and determination, especially through lockdown.

Year 7 have been learning rhythm, African Drumming, keyboard skills, improvisation, composing scary music, ukulele, with opportunities to play guitar.

Year 8 have been learning how to use a Digital Audio Workstation (DAW) through composing and writing their own arrangement of 'Someone You Loved', by Lewis Capaldi. They have also studied the history of popular music through Blues, Rock n Roll and Rock. They are currently learning 'structure' through ground bass and theme and variations. There have been opportunities for developing keyboard skills - melody and chords, ukulele and guitar.

Year 9 have been learning how to used a DAW to create hooks, riffs and loops. They have also created their own remix of a popular song, choosing between Ed Sheeran, Ariana Grande, Stormzy and Dua Lipa. Year 9 have studied film music, composing music for a 'scene' of different genres. Year 9 have been gaining more independence in performance, with some students choosing to perform a GCSE Music standard piece on their chosen instrument. This has then been assessed using the GCSE criteria. Many of our Year 9 students have chosen to study GCSE Music next year.

GCSE and A Level students have coped extremely well during these unprecedented times and have continued to amaze us with the quality of their performances and compositions, despite most of their lessons being taught remotely.

Many of our students have continued to access instrumental tuition and despite many lessons being taught online, several students have completed exams this year, many achieving distinctions!

We have thoroughly missed extra-curricular activities and our concerts this academic year and we look forward to resuming these ASAP.

Obituaries

Ronald Eadon

Ronald Eadon was born in October 1927 in very modest circumstances; his Father was a file forger. After his time at the School (on a scholarship I believe) he entered the legal profession in Sheffield as a solicitor's clerk.

His career was immediately interrupted by national service in the Navy, during which time he trained as a writer. In this capacity he found himself keeping the ship's log on the lead minesweeper during Operation Retail - the Corfu Channel Incident - in late 1946. After being demobbed in 1947 he returned to the law and moved to Leicester in 1954.

After studying for his articles whilst working full time and with young children in the house, he qualified as a solicitor in 1963. He eventually retired as Senior Partner of his practice in 1993 and enjoyed an active retirement travelling widely in the UK and overseas.

After being sadly widowed in 2012 Ronald Eadon passed away in late 2019, shortly after his 92nd Birthday.
