Emily Beatty (Year 12, pictured) was invited to be part of a team of six students attending the Balkan Mathematical Olympiad. The team of six is chosen from the very best students in the UK with the stipulation that they are only allowed to attend the event once.

During her time at King Edward VII Emily has developed into one of the best young mathematicians in the country. Her performances in the British Mathematical Olympiad led to her being invited to a training camp at Trinity College Cambridge with twenty-one other students from across the country.

From this training camp, Emily was chosen to represent the United Kingdom at the Balkan Mathematical Olympiad in Ohrid, Macedonia from the 2nd – 7th May 2017. Emily performed exceptionally well, answering two of the four questions perfectly in the four and a half hour exam and she won a Bronze Medal.

Of the other team members, three were from private grammar schools. The other two were from large split site comprehensive schools.

Emily said, "I'm so proud to have represented the UK at the Balkans, and I can't believe I've got a medal! All the hard work paid off and the trip was amazing."

Our role as Campaign Champions is to speak up about the right to education and to remind world leaders of their promise that all children should have a quality, stable education by 2030 as was promised by the Sustainable Develop-



ment Goals. However, there is currently a 39 billion dollar gap in the funding to achieve this and this is where we come in. The campaign this year focuses on "the missing piece of the puzzle" which is money. Priti Patel (The Secretary of State for International Development) is making the key decision as to whether the UK Government will increase the amount of foreign aid spent on education.

We became Campaign Champions through School and with the help of Miss Garside. We first had to fill out an application form answering questions about motives to join the campaign. As there was only one application allowed per school, all the entries within the School were judged by the teachers and ours was chosen to be sent off. Our application was shortlisted and the next stage was to have a Skype interview with Ellie McDonald, who works for the charity, which was very nerve racking but we soldiered on after a few technical mishaps and it went really well. The next week we found out we were Campaign Champions!

This is where the hard work really started. We went to Beaumanor Hall in Leicestershire for our training weekend. We meet the other campaigners, who were all lovely, ate some really nice food and learnt lots about the campaign and our role. This gave

us a drive for the next part of our campaign. We started off with a photo stunt! The number 263 represents the 263 million children out of education worldwide.

We are now continuing with our local community campaign through King Edward VII and our feeder schools but are also hoping to branch out into other places like youth groups and the university. We also have some national events planned like the Parliamentary Action Day in London.

We will keep you updated on our campaign and hope you get behind it. It ends in November 2017 and we are excited to see what we achieve.

Science Week

Each year during the national "Science Week", previously called Science and Engineering week, a huge number of events are organised to raise the profile of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects and their related careers. This year we had more events than ever!

This focussed period of activities is engaging and fun, as well as giving students' food for thought about what they might want to do later in life. The events this year included:

- **Engineering Extravaganza** A group of students from Year 8 and 9 visited the Advanced Manufacturing Research Centre (AMRC) for a day learning about different aspects of engineering.
- **Living in Space** an exciting talk delivered to all Year 7 students which covered what we would need to live, survive and colonise space.
- **RAF Flight roadshow** an engaging talk delivered to all Year 9 students by engineers from the RAF considering how flight works; it included the demonstration of a real jet engine!
- **Warwick Castle Science Fair** A trip to Warwick Castle for the students who have been involved in the Lower School STEM Club this year (Years 7-9).
- **Exploring STEM for girls** a visit to the University of Sheffield to encourage girls to consider engineering as a career.

At the Upper School site we also had three advanced level talks for Sixth Form students and Y11 students entitled:

Mysterious neutrinos iPhones, cavemen, health and happiness Two hands of nature

Year 7 students visited the University of Sheffield to carry out forensics investigations, with year 9 students also visiting the University of Sheffield to synthesise aspirin.

At King Edward VII School we believe it is crucial that, as well as delivering high quality lessons throughout the year, subjects like Science, Maths and Technology are able to offer these enrichment activities to further develop student understanding and interest.

Before the end of the year we also have a trip to Sheffield Hallam University where Year 9 girls will be encouraged to see how STEM can be used to rebuild communities after a natural disaster or war.

Celebrating women in computer science and engineering

We had a fantastic day at Upper School on 23rd June, where over 100 guests from all over the country attended a celebration event organised by Mr Kavanagh (see if you can spot him in the photo!) to coincide with the International Women in Engineering Day 2017.



The day was attended by schools from all over South Yorkshire; 80 girls took part.

There were four computer science and engineering workshops for the girls to take part in. The students programmed robots to detect water, heat and to work their way around obstacles. They built and tested solar powered cars, programmed BBC MicroBits to set rockets off built from K'nex and programmed the University of Sheffield's very special Neo Bots.

The girls then took part in a Speed Careers event where women computer scientists and engineers spoke to the girls about the opportunities available to them and shared their experiences and personal stories with the students. A thoroughly inspiring day for the students, who left many positive comments on our graffiti wall.

For this edition, we profile one of our governors, Dr. Peter Dickson

Peter Dickson is Vice-Chair of Governors at King Edward VII School. Initially elected to the Governing Body as a Parent Governor (Peter has a daughter in Year 9 and a son in the Sixth Form) he is now a co-opted member of the Governing Body.

Peter attended the University of Warwick, South Bank University and latterly the University of Sheffield where he obtained his Doctorate in 2003. He has spent the majority of his career in Local Authority education management and administration.

Peter works for the Local Authority's Children, Young People and Families Directorate where he manages a service dealing with challenging school issues surrounding children, their parents and carers and works closely with headteachers and other governing bodies across the city. He is very experienced in child protection procedures, safeguarding, behaviour, inclusion, SEN, attendance and a wide range of difficult pupil issues. He is Chair of Governors at a Sheffield Primary School and a Local Leader of Governance. Local Leaders use their skills and experience to support other Chair of Governors to improve school and academy performance and ensure that in Sheffield there is a group of experienced and skilled governors available who are able to be quickly deployed to support local schools.

Peter is passionate about education and governance issues and is keen to support the School Leadership Team to deliver the best outcomes for all the students at King Edward VII School.

We have participated, for several years now, in a programme organised by the German Cultural Institute and the German Academic Exchange Service whereby a teacher from Germany gets placed in a British school for two weeks - at no cost to the schools (as long as they provide accommodation). The Germans are vetting the teachers and support them financially with their travel costs etc.

This scheme has always worked very well for us as these teachers are keen to get involved in lessons and working with small groups of students for conversation practice etc.

We were pleased to welcome Gabi Matt, a teacher from Cologne, who worked with our German A-Level students in preparation for their oral exams.

In the community

Earlier in June, six students from **Year 7** volunteered to attend the Wesley Hall in Crookes and served 40 pensioners their lunch. On arrival, the students set the tables and arranged the coffee station.

As the pensioners arrived, the students greeted them and showed them to their seats. They then served drinks followed by a hot meal and dessert. The students then joined them for lunch which consisted of roast gammon followed by lemon sponge and custard.

They were great ambassadors for KES with several people commenting positively on their excellent manner. Well done to all who took part.

Did you Know?

Our School was established by Sheffield City Council in 1905 by amalgamating two, much older, existing boys' schools.

It was planned that the new School (also a boys' only school) would use the superb Palladian School building that had been built by the Sheffield Methodists and named **Wesley College** after John Wesley, the famous 18th century preacher. The Council had bought the building in 1904 and the front exterior looks exactly the same today as it did in 1838 when Wesley College first opened.

Most of the first pupils of the new School came from **Sheffield Royal Grammar School** (founded 1604) whose main building still exists on Collegiate Crescent and is part of Sheffield Hallam's Collegiate Campus today. Some boys joined the new School who had been at Wesley College, but that had been a boarding school and not so many of their pupils opted to stay on and join the new King Edward VII School.

Because the City Council intended that this new School would be of the highest standard, as good as any school in Yorkshire, they petitioned the King (Edward VII 1901-10) to ask to use his name. He agreed just before Christmas 1904 and so a new coat of arms was created that is still the school's badge today.



The top half of the Arms shows the **Arms** of the City of Sheffield. They are crossed silver arrows on a blue background representing the metalwork and cutlery heritage of Sheffield and below three sheaves of straw on a green background (i.e. Sheaf Field).

On the lower left side are the arms of **Sheffield Royal Grammar School.**

They show an early 17th century schoolboy who appears to be pierced by arrows, but in fact he is standing in front of the crossed arrows that were Sheffield's original Arms before the Nineteenth Century.

On the lower right side are the arms of Wesley College, which include John Wesley's arms on the left and London University's on the right. (You can see these arms more clearly on the coloured plaque in the Upper School Entrance Hall). The reason London University's arms are shown is because for many years after 1844, Wesley College offered older students courses leading to degrees of London University.

The **Crest** with a Rampant Lion holding a shield is taken exactly from the crest on the City of Sheffield's Arms. This Lion crest was the School's blazer and cap badge on the old uniforms before 1982.

The Latin motto **Fac Recte**, **Nil Time** means "Do Right and Fear Nought." It was selected at the last minute in 1905 by the new Headmaster, Dr. Hichens. It was his family's motto.

The title of the School around the belt scroll, **Reg. Edward VII Schola**, **Escaf.**, is Latin for King Edward VII School, Sheffield. Escafeld is the Latin interpretation of the name of Sheffield.
